Settling in

Passes

You must show your current ID and parking permit each time you enter the site and you must remove both from sight when you exit. Personal passes should be displayed upon your person at all times when you are on site.

Parking permits

To obtain a permanent vehicle pass, you are required to produce your course registration document.

Security

Bags and briefcases should be labelled and should not be left unattended at any time or they will be treated as a security threat.

There is no general secure telephone system on-site. Please take note of any security briefings and notices that come into operation from time to time.

Internet Access

Use of Wi-Fi on-site

There are numerous wi-fi hotspots on-site, some of which are available for general use.

Details of these will be supplied on arrival and during your IT induction.

DII accounts for military staff

If students require DII access whilst on their course, it is suggested they acquire a DII account before arrival. No accounts will be issued to students on-site. Access can be gained from the first floor of Trenchard building.

Accessing information on internal web sites

Cranfield University and the Defence Academy are two independent but interacting entities – the Cranfield Intranet offers specific information on Cranfield University and the DAIS (Defence Academy Information Service) provides MOD specific information, as well as details of shared services at Shrivenham.

The University intranet provides all sorts of information related to studying at Cranfield University and the support available to you. It is also where student-related announcements are published.

You can access it on and off the site – simply enter your Cranfield username and password when logging in. This will have been given to you when you registered.

Where to eat on-site

There are two main cafés on-site, both are on the maps available on the DAIS. Other places where food is available are also listed below.

Café & Chat

In Building 66 (situated between the Barrington Library and the chapel) – offers a range of hot and cold food including packed sandwiches, jacket potatoes, soup, confectionery and drinks. Indoor and outdoor seating.

Open 0730hrs to 1500hrs Monday to Thursday, and 0800hrs to 1430hrs on Fridays.

Slim Café

In the Slim Building (near Beckett Gate) – offers a range of hot and cold food including packed sandwiches, jacket potatoes, soup, confectionery and drinks. Indoor and outdoor seating.

Open 0730hrs to 1600hrs Monday to Thursday and 0730hrs to 1430hrs on Fridays.

Barrington Library

There is an informal seating area with a couple of vending machines providing snacks and hot and cold drinks.



Officers' Mess

Students are entitled to become members of the Officers' Mess and to use the bars and restaurants, even if they do not live on-site.

The mess dining room is based in Kitchener Hall near the main gate. It offers a canteen-style set menu with different options every day, which is displayed outside the mess hall. You can dine here, providing you are a member of the mess, or accompanied by one.

A variety of food is available, including hot main courses, filled baguettes and salads. A three course meal is also available. The mess uses a pay-asyou-dine system, and the cost of a three course evening meal is £3.46.

Mess rules must be adhered to and there is a dress code during the day and evening. Details of this are covered on page 42.

Other food outlets

There are supermarkets, restaurants, fast food outlets and pubs within walking distance in the nearby villages and all the facilities of the large town of Swindon are within a 20 minute bus ride or drive.

Communicating with the University

As you embark on your studies with Cranfield University at the Defence Academy it is important that you set up the most effective way to maintain contact with the University for your period of studies, which will likely be between 3 and 5 years.

Email

The University will provide you with a Cranfield email address XXXX@ cranfield.ac.uk which is an 'academic' email address and this is the main means of communication with students by the University. The University will also ask you to provide an alternate email address which is the one you need to consider carefully before providing. We recommend the use of a personal email address, or MOD address. The email address needs to be readily accessible from an internet connection and an address. you maintain. The use of DII or role based addresses are not as easily accessed as personal addresses.



It is very straightforward to set up a forward from the Cranfield email address to the one of your choosing – this can be done within EVE and is covered during your induction.

Mail

Mail for full-time students without a specific address will be delivered to the SAS office. Part-time students should arrange to have university related mail sent to their home address.

Libraries

Barrington Library

First aid

A list showing your nearest First Aider is displayed in all classrooms. Defibrillators for use in the case of suspected heart attacks are in place at strategic points around the site.

Fire and emergency

Fire alarms are tested weekly on Wednesdays, in each building, lasting 30 seconds to one minute. If the alarm sounds for longer you are to leave the building and go to your Evacuation Assembly Point (EAP) – (see plans on display in classrooms, or in Health and Safety booklet) and await further instructions.

If the Station Siren is sounded it represents an 'Emergency State' and students are to remain in the buildings until further instructions are given.

Police station

The nearest police station is on the edge of Swindon, situated near to the Sainsbury's along the A420. The 66 bus route stops directly outside.

Medical and dental services

Military students

The on-site Medical Facility is available to military personnel only.

If you have more than one medical problem please make a double appointment at the time of booking.

The opening hours are Mon – Thu 0800 to 1630 and Fri 0800 to 1600, it is closed for lunch 1230 to 1330 daily. If you need to be seen out of hours (including weekends and bank

holidays) please phone the NHS on 111 (this is a civilian number). In case of a genuine emergency at any time you should dial 999 immediately and quote postcode SN6 8TS



The Main Gate Reception should also be notified so they can direct the ambulance to your location.

The Dental Centre is open the same hours as the Medical Facility.

If out of hours emergency dental treatment is required the Main Gate Reception should be contacted on 96161 5615 or +44 (0)1793 785615 who hold details of the Duty Dental Officer.

Insurance

All students are advised to take out insurance for their personal possessions and private overseas travel.

The University has arranged travel and medical insurance cover for students travelling overseas on University business, including project work and sandwich placements.

Students travelling abroad in this capacity should obtain a 'letter of indemnity' or 'travel insurance card' to carry with them. This will be required if medical treatment is necessary. Your Course Leader will advise you on this.

Please note that the University will not accept any liability for loss or damage to any personal property brought on to the Shrivenham site or left in vehicles.

Student Advice Centre

We provide a variety of help and support. Our remit is extensive and changes daily as people present us with different issues.

Local amenities

Travel in the local area

Buses

Travelling about the local area is relatively easy, with regular buses between all of the towns and most of the villages. The most useful of these bus routes is the S6 bus service, which runs between Swindon and Oxford, stopping in Shrivenham, Watchfield, and Faringdon and close to both the Main and Beckett Gates of the Defence Academy site. Stagecoach bus passes

As students you are offered discounted bus fares on all Stagecoach West services, as part of their Green Travel Initiative.

Your DMR pass (your site access pass) acts as your bus pass. It can be used to purchase discounted tickets, including single fares and weekly and monthly passes.

Trains

Both Swindon and Oxford have well-connected railway stations, and a train to London Paddington Station takes less than an hour from either, and can cost much less when booked in advance.

Trains to Bristol take less than half an hour from Swindon, and about an hour from Oxford.

For all rail information including all train services from any railway station in the country, go to www.nationalrail.co.uk

It is also worth looking at www. southernrailway.com, which also provides tickets for the majority of services in the south of England and often have cheaper prices than National Rail Enguiries.

Coaches

An alternative mode of transport about the country is by coach. National Express, www.nationalexpress.co.uk have coach services to many destinations about the UK and can often be cheaper than travelling by train, with many services travelling from Swindon and Oxford.

Oxford also has a very good connection to London via the Oxford Tube coach service, www.oxfordtube.com, which leaves as often as every 15 minutes and runs throughout the night.

Taxis

Taxis are an effective way of getting around the local area, especially for those who do not know their way



around particularly well.

Taxis are generally more expensive than the local bus services but when the cost is split between several people they become a lot more affordable.

If you require a taxi to come onto the site you should inform Main Gate Reception, giving your name, taxi company name, time and location of pick up.

It costs approximately £15 to travel from Shrivenham to Swindon centre. The Main Gate Reception will already have details of your initial visit to the site.

Banking and cashpoints

Cash dispensing machines are available on-site at the Churchill Lecture Theatre and Café and Chat and off-site at the Co-op Swift Shop (next to McDonald's) opposite the main gate.

Petrol stations

The nearest petrol station is an Esso situated on the A420, just this side of the police station, but is only accessible when heading eastbound out of Swindon. Access from the other direction requires

continuing to the Gablecross Roundabout and returning back along the A420 towards Watchfield.

Sainsbury's has a petrol station situated next to its car park. The fuel prices here usually match up to those at the Esso petrol station on the A420.

There is a petrol station on the way to Oxford from Watchfield. There is one situated on the A417 close to the roundabout where it joins the A420 just outside Faringdon.

There are also a couple more petrol stations further along the A420 towards Oxford. The fuel prices here are usually a couple of pence more expensive than those on the edge of Swindon.

Supermarkets

The nearest supermarkets are Waitrose, Tesco and Aldi at Faringdon. There is also a Sainsbury's on the edge of Swindon, located where the A420 meets the A419 at the White Hart Roundabout. The car park is accessed by the first roundabout along the A420, from the White Hart Roundabout, near the Police Station. There is also a large Tesco situated near to Swindon FC's football ground, and a large Asda and Marks and Spencer at the Orbital Shopping Centre on the north side of Swindon.

Understanding your IT accounts

Cranfield Defence and Security (CDS) IT provision

The following is a brief introduction to the Cranfield University and Defence Academy IT provision at CDS, Shrivenham.

Unlike our other Schools at Cranfield University Bedfordshire, CDS is on a Ministry of Defence site and, consequently, has a complex IT infrastructure.

The IT network at the Defence Academy is classified RESTRICTED HIGH, therefore, it is essential that procedures in security operating procedures (link under the Defence Academy IT Account section) are followed to the letter.

Please note the use of USB sticks on Defence Academy network is not permitted. Cranfield University has endeavoured to provide you with a suite of IT resources which will support your learning throughout your postgraduate studies.

The use of international plugs is not permitted at the Defence Academy. Any electrical items which you intend to plug into the mains electrical system should have the international plug removed and replaced with a British 13 Amp 3 pin plug with the appropriate fuse. These works should be carried out by a competent person.

Prior to using any electrical equipment on-site, it must be subject to Personal Appliance Testing (PAT testing). There will be an opportunity for you to have your electrical items PAT tested during your induction process.

EVE

https://eve.cranfield.ac.uk

Normally your Cranfield username and password will be emailed to you two weeks before the start of your course. You will be given the opportunity to complete the pre-registration process online using these details to access EVE, thus simplifying the registration process on your first day on-site. Completing this process is also essential in the activation of your Cranfield IT account.

You will be asked to answer four security questions which are used by Cranfield to verify your identity. As your course progresses, you will also be able to view your examination results using EVE and update your personal details so that the University can maintain contact with you both during your registration and once you leave the University.

Defence Academy IT account

The Defence Academy IT account allows you to log onto the Defence Academy network from the majority of computers on-site.

The network is owned by the MOD and subject to MOD controls so before accessing the network you must:

- Read the User Security
 Operating Procedures
 (SyOPs) for workstations
 connected to the network
- Read the Acceptable Use Policy (AUP) for IT and Telephones
- Complete the Account Acceptance Form indicating that you agree to abide by the requirements of the SyOPs and AUP before your account will be issued.

Your network access allows you access to the internet. You will be given a Defence Academy account with a storage area which is only available on-site.

Your password will have to be changed regularly. It must be a 'strong' password and you cannot re-use any previous password. More details can be found in the SyOPs.

There are 60 machines available 24 hours a day in rooms CC26 and CC27 (provided the rooms are not being used for teaching) and 30 computers in the Barrington Library available during opening hours.

Wi-Fi / Bring Your Own Device (BYOD)

You will find free business class Wi-Fi for use with personal devices in several buildings on-site. It is supported by Serco IT and supplies internet access only. You cannot access the DA network using the Wi-Fi service. Further instructions on how to connect to the DA Wi-Fi can be found on the DAIS.

Cranfield University provides you with a suite of Internet enabled services, available for the duration of your studies:

Travel Grants

Gym

The gym is situated in Burgoyne House, between Kitchener and Roberts Halls. The gym has a cardio suite, weights room and holds circuit training and spinning classes several times a week. Opening hours are 0500 to 2300 Monday to Friday, and access can be gained via a code at weekends which you can obtain from Churchill reception on production of a valid gym card.

In order to use the gym, there is a subscription fee of £36.50 that can be paid in several ways. You can either pay in cash when you go to your gym induction (see below), you can pay via your Mess Account (see above) or if you are a student who lives on-site you are already paying for membership.

Before you can use the gym you must carry out an induction with a member of the gym staff, where you will be given an induction card. There are three induction sessions run weekly. These sessions are at 1315 on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesdays.

The CSA's tips: Activities off-site

Whilst there is a lot to do on-site, everybody needs to get away for a while, and there are lots of places to visit and see around the area.



There are a few things to do in Watchfield and Shrivenham, and the site is reasonably near to Swindon and Oxford. Swindon is only about ten miles away, and Oxford about twenty miles away in the opposite direction.

Both have excellent, regular bus services that stop outside the Defence Academy gates. Both places have all sorts of places to visit and things to do.

There are also many smaller towns and villages in the area, including Highworth, Faringdon and Wantage, and slightly further afield, Marlborough and Witney.

Even farther afield are the cities Bath and Salisbury. You could also catch a train to Bristol or London.



Links to tourist websites and What's On information for the local area are included below.

On top of the many towns and villages in the area, there

are also famous landmarks about the area such as the White Horse Hill near Uffington, and we're not too far to travel by car to see the historic sites Stonehenge and Avebury.

Watchfield

There are a small number of retail outlets across the other side of the Watchfield roundabout opposite the main entrance to the Defence Academy. Here you can find a bank of shops including a Cooperative mini supermarket, who also have a dry cleaners included (ask at the tills), an opticians, a Subway sandwich shop and a hairdressers.

There is also a McDonald's, and a pub restaurant called "The College Farm", who offer two for one on all main course meals, and also give 20% off the cost of any food on top of that if you eat there on a Monday and show your Defence Academy base pass.

Further along Majors Road there is an Industrial Estate called "Shrivenham Hundred Business Park". Situated here, visible from the road, is a coffee shop called "Bloomfields Cafe", which sells tea, coffee, cakes, breakfasts and hot lunches. There is also a hairdresser's on the Business Park called "Absolutely Gorgeous".

There is a pub, The Eagle, situated on Eagle Lane, just off High Street, in Watchfield.

Shrivenham

At the site end of the High Street there are three pubs popular with staff and students; The Prince of Wales, The Barrington Arms, which also provides bed and breakfast accommodation, and The Crown. Further along are two Indian restaurants and a Chinese take-away.

Useful information for international students

We are aware that a large proportion of the student body here at Cranfield University, Shrivenham, are international students and may be arriving in the UK for the first time, or have little or no knowledge of the local area. The CSA is always very happy to give any advice that we can to help students solve problems that may arise, but we have also listed a few things that we think may be helpful.

Visa and immigration – advice and support

If you are an international student, Cranfield's dedicated Student Immigration team is here to support you. They offer confidential advice on a range of student-related immigration matters, including Tier 4 student and dependent visas.

How the team can help you

- Advising on Tier 4 visa responsibilities, such as work limitations and travel rules.
- Assisting with Tier 4 (General) visa extensions, including Doctoral Extension Scheme.
- Advising you should there be changes to your circumstances that may affect your visa.
- Providing advice on other visa categories, including Short-term Study visas.
- EU Schengen visa applications.

- Issuing endorsement letters for Tier 1 Graduate Entrepreneur applicants.
- Following up ATAS application delays.
- Advising on options to remain in the UK to work after study.

Health advice for international students

Before you travel to the UK

If you are undergoing medical treatment, have pre-existing serious health issues before you travel, or if you are registered as disabled, we advise you to bring your current prescriptions and a doctor's report (translated into English). This is to ensure you can get

the help you need while in the UK.

Your documents should give details of your condition, all treatment and medication you require, plus any assistance you will need while you study in the UK.

When you arrive for UK study, you may be asked to produce health certificates detailing your vaccinations. If you are coming from a tuberculosis (TB) highrisk area, a chest x-ray report may also be required. It is a good idea to carry these documents in your hand luggage, as you may have to show them before passing through UK immigration.

Ask the British Embassy or High Commission in your home country what inoculations you need to be admitted to study in the UK. To find your nearest office visit the FCO (Foreign and Commonwealth Office) website.

We hope you do not have any health issues while you are with us in the UK. But if you do then our health services are very accessible and many international students are entitled to free or subsidised treatment on the NHS (National Health Service). Your UK course needs to be at least six months in duration to be eligible, although free emergency treatment may be available if you are here for less time.

If you are not entitled to NHS treatment you should take out international student health insurance before you leave home or as soon as you arrive to study in the UK.

The NHS for international students

To find out if you are entitled to NHS services in the UK visit the Department of Health website.

Many international students will be entitled to use the National Health Service (NHS), which offers free health care paid for by British tax-payers.

The following NHS treatments are free:

- some emergency treatment (but not follow-up treatment),
- · family planning services,
- treatment of certain communicable diseases,
- compulsory psychiatric treatment.

However, all other NHS treatment is subject to restrictions. As an international student, you may not qualify for it, and may need to get medical insurance instead. Check our summary below to find out. As for health or life insurance you will have to look elsewhere. Providers and applicable laws vary from country to country.

EEA nationals

If you come from a European Economic Area (EEA) country, you and your family qualify for full NHS treatment. You should obtain a European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) before coming to the UK, which entitles you to treatment. EEA countries are: Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Republic of Ireland, Italy, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, The Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain and Sweden.

Non-EEA nationals

If you are not from an EEA country, you will still qualify for full NHS treatment if you meet the following conditions:

- If your course lasts six months or more. In England and Wales, if you have a husband, wife or children accompanying you as your dependents (not just as your visitors), they can also receive treatment. However, the children must be under the age of sixteen (or nineteen, if in full-time education).
- If your course is less than six months long and you are studying in Scotland.
- If your course is less than six months long, and the UK government is providing at least 35 per cent of the funding for your course. You will need to provide evidence of this. However, you might not be eligible for GP treatment.

Swiss nationals

If you are Swiss, or a national of one of the FU member states who has come

to study in the UK from Switzerland, you will have the same healthcare eligibility as EEA nationals. However, this may not apply to you if you are a national of Norway, Iceland or Liechtenstein and have been resident in Switzerland before coming to the UK.

Reciprocal health care agreement countries

The UK has reciprocal health care agreements with some countries. The list of countries sometimes changes, so check with your health authorities to see if your country is amongst them. If you are covered by a reciprocal health care agreement, you will be eligible for some NHS treatment even if your course lasts for less than six months. The reciprocal health care agreement will probably cover hospital treatment if a condition arises during your stay. However, it usually does not cover hospital treatment for a pre-existing condition. You should check with your country's health care authorities to find out how much treatment you will be entitled to: you may still have to take out medical insurance

Keeping healthy while you study in the UK

You can keep healthy in the UK the same way you do at home:

- eat nutritious foods (see 'Where to eat, page 5)
- exercise regularly (see 'Activities on-site' page 27)
- get enough sleep.

Remedies for minor illnesses such as headaches and colds are available from high street chemists, most supermarkets and some other shops. They are available without a doctor's prescription. For minor health concerns, rather than visiting your doctor, you can get advice from a qualified pharmacist at any chemist.

Language centres

For international students who would like to improve their spoken English, there are several options available. There is a Defence Academy Language Centre on Axis Road, just off the High Street in Watchfield who offer both group and private tutorials for all experience levels. For more information visit the Living/Community pages on the DAIS, or call +44 (0)1793 784881.

You could also visit the Jubilee Community Centre on Wednesdays at lunchtime, for casual English conversation. If you would like to participate, call Rebecca Dunne on +44 (0)1793 780793.

You could also search for "language centres in Swindon" in Google for a list of other language tuition in the local area.

Driving in the UK

Many people find that it is very useful to be able to drive a car, especially as Shrivernham is 10 miles from the nearest large town. A lot of international students who have driving licences may be able to use them in the UK directly, although some nationalities may have to convert their national driving licence to a UK driving licence. Banking

Most high-street banks in the UK offer student accounts. There is a large choice of banks available in Swindon Town Centre. When you open an account with a bank, be sure to ask for a student



account and remember take your 'pink' student registration form with you as proof of student status. Make sure that you understand all of the terms and conditions associated with the account and ensure that there are no hidden charges associated with the account type you are opening.

Contact the CSA for help.

Communication

Being such a long distance from home can sometimes feel lonely and many people like to keep in regular contact with their families and friends. There are a number of options available, the cheapest of which is Skype.

For more information on Skype go to www.skype.com

When making phone calls to international mobile or landline numbers it can get very expensive. There are a number of international SIM cards available for mobile phones, designed with international phone calls in mind. These include Lycamobile and Lebara. For more information on each of these services visit their websites at www.lycamobile.co.uk and www.lebara-mobile.com respectively.

These SIM cards are free to obtain and can be ordered from the providers' websites, all they require is topping up with credit in order to be used.

Other networks such as O2, Vodafone, T-Mobile, Virgin, BT, Tesco, 3 and Orange provide both contract and pay-as-you-go service, which are very good for UK calls. Occasionally you may be able to pick up a decent package that allows international calls to a couple of numbers that you specify, but these international packages are usually more expensive than the above-mentioned international specific services.

Getting connected

The three main internet providers in the UK are BT, Virgin and Sky.

Depending on your location and the exact specifications, such as speed, capacity, monthly usage limit and cost, each provider has different strengths



and weaknesses, and it is definitely worth shopping around and comparing each before deciding to go with one.

There is also the option to use a mobile broadband USB dongle from one of the above-mentioned networks, and there will usually be a discount for having a phone service and a mobile internet package provided by the same company.

The downside to mobile internet is that the download speeds and maximum monthly usage are usually less than those provided by broadband services.

Shrivenham Station Officers' Mess rules

Shrivenham Station Officers' Mess

The Shrivenham Station Officers' Mess currently comprises Kitchener Hall. Roberts Hall. Beckett House. Mountbatten House and Templer House and is an integral part of the Defence Academy. It is traditionally the officers' living quarters on-site. At Shrivenham, Kitchener and Roberts Mess Halls are used mainly for catering, with students staving in Mountbatten House and Templar House. These Mess buildings also provide temporary accommodation that can be booked by any member of the Mess. Please note rooms are limited with UK military and international military students having priority over civilians.

It is worth noting that there is a set of Officers' Mess Rules, including a smart-casual dress code that must be obeyed or you may be asked to leave; this includes no jeans, trainers, flip-flops, t-shirts or hoodies, and any skirts must be worn below the knee. The whole list of rules and regulations are available on the DAIS and will be provided to you upon mess membership.

All Cranfield University students are entitled to join the Officers' Mess, and it is compulsory for military students. There is a small amount of administration that needs to be carried out before mess membership can be achieved and a small fee applies.

All Mess information including accommodation, menus, pricing, etc is available on the Defence Academy Information Service (DAIS). Please access the site and familiarise yourself with rules and regulations. Meal times and dress code are summarised here

Shrivenham Station Fund

Upon joining the Officer's Mess you will automatically contribute to the Shrivenham Station fund. This costs £0.10 per day, paid in monthly instalments by Direct Debit. The Shrivenham Station Fund subscription also provides you with membership to the Athletics Union, which permits membership of many excellent sports clubs.

Open access accommodation Wi-Fi

For students accommodated in any of the Defence Academy Officers' mess buildings, open access Wi-Fi is available through a commercial partnership between Serco and Wifinity Ltd. You may connect up to two of your own personal devices including PCs, laptops, smart phones, tablets or games consoles. Access is available on a daily, weekly or four weekly basis starting at just over 50p per day with no minimum contract. Wifinity provides service to over 45 military sites throughout the UK

Personal portable equipment

All power leads and adaptors used onsite must be CE (Conformité Européenne) marked and meet Bristish standards. Power leads that do not meet this requirement should not be used on-site. PAT testing sessions and more advice will be available during induction week.

Cranfield University does not have University owned or managed accommodation at Shrivenham.

Please note that the premises listed have not been inspected by university personnel and, as such, no guarantee, warranty, condition or recommendation is given by the University that the premises are safe and properly maintained. The safety of the premises is the legal responsibility of the landlord.

International students are strongly urged not to bring their families to the UK before satisfactory accommodation arrangements have been made.

Many of our students live in rented houses or rooms in shared houses, either in the nearby villages of Shrivenham or Watchfield, or in local towns such as Faringdon or Swindon. Rooms and accommodation are advertised on the Student Pad website www.shrivenhamstudentpad.co.uk

Cranfield Students' Association also has a Facebook page - if you ask to be a friend they will automatically add you, and you will be able to ask other students about accommodation options. www.facebook.com/groups/CSAShrivenham

The CSA provides a discussion board on our intranet page where students can advertise available rooms in their accommodation, or try and find housemates to rent a house with. The discussion board also provides a place for students to recommend letting agents in the area.

TV licence

You may require a TV licence; check the website below. Failure to hold a TV licence can result in a fine of up to £1000. www.tvlicensing. co.uk/check-if-you-need-one/ for-your-home/students-aud1/

Letting agencies

There are many letting agents who have details of property to let in Swindon, which is roughly 25 minutes away from Shrivenham.

Letting agencies provide help locating a suitable property for you to rent and they cannot charge you for just conducting a search. However, they can charge a fee if you decide to accept any accommodation they find for you.

A reputable letting agency should only let properties which have heating and which are safe for occupation.

If you decide to register with a letting agent, make sure they are accredited with the National Approved Letting Scheme or that they belong to a professional body such as the Association of Residential Letting Agents or the Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors.

Do not be pressured into signing up for a property. Take your time to make sure the property is right for you. Most agencies will charge an administration fee of between £150 - £300 for dealing with the letting.

You should check any paperwork thoroughly, especially the terms and conditions so that you understand what you are signing.

There should not be any excessive charges - if there are, do not sign the paperwork. If you sign an agreement in the offices of the letting agency, you do not have a cooling off period and will be committed to the lease agreement, unless you can prove that the letting agent has behaved in such a way that can be deemed a Breach of Contract.

Renting private accommodation

Do not hand over any money until you have had a good look around the property: check for obvious signs of disrepair, damp, badly fitting doors or windows, or anything that could compromise your security.

A checklist, which you could use when you view a property, is included on page 49. Do not be pressured into renting the property and always get a receipt for any money which you hand over. It might also help to take someone else with you to get their views on the property.

All properties, whether they are privately let or let through a letting agency, should have a Gas Safety Certificate on display if the property has gas. This shows that the gas fire/cooker/boiler has been serviced and is safe to use.

You should also ask about electrical appliances, as they should be inspected and checked for safety by an approved contractor regularly. If there is a gas fire, the landlord does not legally have to provide a carbon monoxide detector (although it is good practice to do so).

Deposits

Deposits paid for most tenancies have to be protected under a Tenancy Deposit Protection scheme.

These schemes are designed to stop landlords from wrongly withholding part, or all, of your deposit and can help to resolve any disputes.

Landlords often ask for a deposit to cover missing rent or damage to the property. They cannot use the deposit to cover 'normal wear and tear'.

Always get a written receipt for money paid to a landlord or letting agent.

Your deposit should be returned to you if all fees have been settled and the property has not been damaged beyond normal wear and tear.

If you feel that it is being withheld unfairly, contact them by letter and ask for the deposit to be refunded. Say that you require written reasons for the full deposit not being returned.

Keep all copies of your correspondence, as you will need them if you decide to go to court.

If you do not get a reply, or you are unable to resolve the dispute between yourselves, you may need to contact the Citizens Advice Bureau. You can take action through the small claims court but this can be a lengthy process.

Guarantor

Your landlord may ask for a guarantor who agrees to cover costs if you do not pay the rent, or cause significant damage to the property.

A guarantor will usually be a parent or guardian. If you have a joint tenancy with another student, the guarantor will also be jointly liable for overdue rent or damage caused by the other tenants.

Joint tenancies are not recommended as it can place you in severe hardship if other students move out and you are unable to find alternative students to replace the ones who have left.

Guarantors can try and limit their liability by writing it into their guarantor agreement - to do this, you or they should seek independent legal advice.

Landlord

Ask your landlord or letting agent if they will provide an inventory of the contents of the house, including kitchen goods such as the microwave, fridge and toaster.

Take photographs when you move in and give the landlord a copy for future reference. Your landlord will usually be responsible for anything that requires repair, such as the structure of the property, its heating, hot water and sanitary installations, but you should check the terms of your lease to make sure that you understand who is responsible for what.

You should report any defects or damage to your landlord as soon as possible.

If your landlord is acting unreasonably, seek legal advice immediately.
As a tenant, you have legal protection from illegal eviction.

For advice, contact the Citizens
Advice Bureau or, in exceptional
circumstances, the police.
Your Local Authority will also
be able to give you advice.

Houses in multiple occupation

If you want to live with friends in a house, check with your local authority to see if your landlord needs to get a 'House in Multiple Occupation' (HMO) license for the property.

The house must be licensed as a 'House in Multiple Occupation' if it has five or more unrelated people sharing and is three or more storeys high.

Some local authorities may also choose to license houses with smaller

numbers of occupants or storeys. If a property is a HMO, the license requires landlords to be capable managers and to ensure the house is occupied by a limited number of people.

Types of Tenancy Agreements
There are different types of Tenancy
Agreements, which give different levels
of protection during the time that you
are in a rented property. It is important
you are aware of which type of tenancy
you have, as it can affect your rights
over the property and how you use
it. A tenancy is a contract between a
landlord and a tenant that allows the
tenant to live in a property as long as
they pay rent and follow the rules.

It is the document agreed between a landlord and tenant which sets out the legal terms and conditions of the rent contract. A tenancy agreement should be prepared before anyone rents the property.

Tenancy agreements can be either written or verbal but you should use a written tenancy agreement where possible. This will avoid any problems at a later date, as all the tenancy information will be in writing.

Check you understand any terms before agreeing to them. If you have any doubts or concerns, seek legal advice or further advice from the Citizens Advice Bureau.

Types of tenancy

Tenancies usually run for a set period, normally of six months or longer (fixed-term tenancy), or on a monthby-month basis (periodic tenancy).

Assured Shorthold Tenancy (ASTs)

Most people who rent from a private landlord are assured shorthold tenants. You automatically have an assured shorthold tenancy if all of the following apply:

- you moved in on or after 28 February 1997,
- · you pay rent to a private landlord,
- you have control over your home so that your landlord and other people cannot come in whenever they want to.
- your landlord does not live in the same building as you.

You will also be an assured shorthold tenant if you moved in between 15 January 1989 and 27 February 1997 and your landlord gave you a notice saying that you have an assured shorthold tenancy before your tenancy started.

Some types of tenancy cannot be assured shorthold tenancies. These include:

- · business tenancies.
- tenancies where no (or a very low) rent is paid,
- · tenancies that started on or

after 1 April 1990 and where the current rent is more than £100,000 per year,

- tenancies of agricultural land or holdings,
- · college accommodation,
- · holiday lets.

Assured tenancies

You may have an assured tenancy if the tenancy began before 28 February 1997.

This has similar legal rights to an AST but the tenant can stay in the property for an unspecified period of time. There is no automatic right for the landlord to repossess the property at the end of the tenancy.

The landlord must show the court that they have a good reason for wanting possession, using one of the grounds for possession in the legislation.

Assured periodic tenancies

This type of tenancy runs from rent payment to rent payment. The notice period for a tenant to end this type of tenancy will be a period equal to that of the rent period.

The exception is when the rent is paid weekly, when the notice period will then be 28 days.

If the rent is paid on a termly basis, a student will need to give the property owner a 'term's notice'. If the rent is paid on a monthly basis, then one month's notice will be required, even if you have paid rent in advance.

Regulated tenancies

You may have a regulated tenancy if all of the following apply:

- you moved in before 15 January 1989,
- you live in a different building from your landlord,
- you do not get other services included, for example, cleaning.

Regulated tenancies give you more rights than an AST, like increased protection from eviction.

You also have a legal right to apply for a fair rent to be registered for the property. A fair rent is an amount set by a rent officer and is the maximum amount your landlord can charge.

If your tenancy was arranged between 28 November 1980 and 15 January 1989 it may be a protected shorthold tenancy.

This is a type of tenancy with the same legal protection, though it usually runs for a shorter period of time.

Rights and obligations under a tenancy agreement

All types of tenancies include the following rights and obligations.

Tenants' rights should normally include:

freedom to live in the property undisturbed,

- the right to live in a property in a good state of repair - your landlord should make repairs and maintain the property,
- the right to access information about your tenancy at any time,
- · protection from unfair eviction.

You also have the right to protection from unfair rent, to challenge excessively high charges and to have your deposit returned when your tenancy ends.

If you do not pay rent or break other terms of your tenancy agreement you can lose your legal rights as a tenant.

Landlords' rights under a tenancy agreement

Your landlord will also have rights. They can:

- repossess the property when the tenancy ends,
- take back the property if it gets damaged,
- access the property by giving 24 hours' notice,
- take legal action to evict the tenant in some instances – for example, for non-payment of rent.

The tenancy agreement

A Tenancy Agreement should include:

- · the names of all people involved,
- the address of the property,

- · details of the rent,
- the amount of deposit and how it will be protected,
- the start and end date of the tenancy,
- any tenant or landlord obligations,
- which bills the tenant is responsible for.

It may also include details about:

- · how to pay rent,
- if and how the tenancy can be ended early,
- · responsibility for minor repairs,
- whether the property can be let to someone else (sublet) or have lodgers.

Once agreed, you and the agent/ landlord should both sign the agreement. You will receive a copy of your agreement which you should keep somewhere safe.

Do not forget that, at the end of the lease, you will probably have to give your landlord notice that you wish to end the tenancy agreement.

If you have any doubts about the Tenancy Agreement at any time, seek legal advice before you sign it.

Checklist for use when viewing rented accommodation

- · How much is the rent?
- How much is the deposit and do you have to pay rent in advance?
- · Do you have to pay Council Tax?

Location and transport

- How far is it from friends or the University?
- · Are shops or a supermarket close by?
- Is there good access to regular public transport?
- Where is the nearest doctor's surgery or Health Centre?

Condition of the property

- · Is it furnished or unfurnished?
- What sort of heating does it use?
- · What's an average monthly heating bill?
- · Where is the meter?
- · Is there hot and cold running water?
- · Where is the stop cock?
- · Are any of the gutters broken?
- · Are there any broken roof tiles?
- · Are the windows double glazed?
- · Are there signs of damp or mould?
- Do the windows and doors open and close properly?

Furniture and fittings

- What (if any) furniture is provided?
- · Is there enough storage space?
- Is there a washing machine?
- Is a vacuum cleaner provided?
- Condition of the curtains and carpets? (cleaning is one of the main

deductions from a deposit)

- Any cooking equipment provided?
- · Does the cooker work?
- · Does the fridge work?
- · If there is a bed, is it clean?

Health and Safety

- Look out for any fittings, plugs, etc, loose from the wall.
- Are the electrical appliances, provided by the landlord, safe? There should be a sticker on the electrical goods showing that they have been inspected and are safe to use.
- Is there enough ventilation and light?
- Is a certificate of gas safety provided by a Gas Safe Registered engineer within the last 12 months? This should be displayed for inspection if there is gas central heating, gas fire and/or gas cooker.
- If there is a gas fire, there should be a carbon monoxide monitor.
- Is there a working smoke or fire alarm system?
- · Is there a fire blanket in the kitchen?
- Is there an alternative escape route in case the front door is blocked?
- Does the furniture comply with Fire Safety Regulations? Items such as sofas and mattresses should have labels on them to show they pass the regulations.
- How secure are locks on doors/ windows?
- Does the door have a bolt or chain?
